unprepared to take up the huge opportunities for mission to children." The Lausanne Group on Children.

unlikely to change as the individual ages.... The data show that churches can have a very

Reaching Youth in the Philippines

The following impressions come from a WBS campaigner, Angelo Osay, a fourth year nursing student at the University of Baguio City, Philippines:

We are lucky that World Bible School came here in the Philippines to have students around the country. Though WBS' population has increased, it continually



seeks youths to enroll to know God better. WBS also helps its students to develop their speaking and writing skills as well.

At 9:00 a.m. I left Baguio with Quennie Riva Sagyaman and WBS coordinator Alex B. Coloma. As we traveled down the road, the excitement started to burst inside of me. I could not wait to meet my new classmates in WBS and to have new friends.

We arrived in Nueva Ecija at noon. WBS coordinators Gerry Mortera and Jaime welcomed us. After lunch we went to a high school in San Jose City where the principal allowed us to do the campaign with the students. Most of the students were quite cooperative.

In this campaign we distributed about 500 Introductions with help from Madam Juliet Santos, the first enrollee, who

patiently guided us to all the sections. After the campaign we visited Consta-

cio Padilla National H i g h S c h o o l (4,000 stu-



dents) to submit a proposal letter for us to have a campaign there the first week of October.

At the end of the day, all of us were exhausted. But that is nothing compared to the joy that we felt inside, touching the hearts of the students. I am glad to help in meeting the goal of WBS to encourage people — most especially the youths — to enroll with WBS to know God and have a well directed life like mine.

A Typical Report

At the Pasay West National High School our seven WBS campaigners distributed 3,000 Introductory Lessons in two days. The school population is 6,000 students. The school administration wants us to focus on second year to fourth year students. Returned answer sheets already amount to 1, 700 [confirmed enrollees]. Most of them cannot

afford to pay the postage stamp, so we placed a drop box in the library and at the guard house for the students to drop in their answer sheets. WBS Volunteer Ian Fuentes of Makati collects the answer sheets and sends them on to our office in Baguio.

The youth here in the Philippines are more receptive than the adults. They made a great impact not only on their lives but their loved ones as well. They use WBS courses to enrich their knowledge about the word of God as well as to improve their English proficiency. The schools also associated our courses with their Values Education Class.

Fantastic Growth Factors

January 6, 2007, about 20 leaders met at Legacy church of Christ in Fort Worth, Tex. to network for evangelizing Nigeria. Don Hall of the Crestview church in Waco helped to organize and document the meeting. Excerpts from Wendell Broom, mission professor emeritus, and Wes Murphy, World Bible School (WBS) coordinator at Crestview, reflect factors for Nigeria's outstanding church growth.

Wendell Broom: C.A.O. Essien was the first Nigerian convert by our Bible

correspondence in 1948. That work has grown exponentially under WBS. The largest numbers are: 1,000 churches of Christ in Ethiopia,






1,700 in Kenya, 2,000 in Ghana, 4,000 in Malawi, and 3,850 in Nigeria. In Nigeria the congregations average 90 members, ranging from a handful to over 1,000 members. Nigeria alone has 21 Bible Colleges teaching students to live and proclaim the Word of God. Here are major reasons for the unparalleled success in Africa:

a. God prepared a receptive people.

b. Dedicated labor by pioneers and missionaries who taught and trained the masses. "Their emphasis was to train preachers who would train preachers who would train preachers....to plant churches that would plant churches that would....!"

c. Extensive Bible correspondence teaching that is effectively spearheaded by WBS.

a. Sending two or three WBS study

booklets at a time to each student.

b. Ample supplies of tracts and leaflets that teach on specific topics as needed.

c. As tests are returned from Nigeria, our volunteer teachers (ranging from 10 to 15 volunteers) grade and return the lessons through our WBS office to be sent to Nigeria.

d. We constantly receive more names of prospective students than we can handle. Surplus names are referred to Cedar Park or others.

e. Our work is primarily in Kogi and Benue States, and Abuja.

f. Each year up to 15 Seminars or Gospel Meetings are scheduled to follow up with WBS students.

g. Each year Crestview pays for limited travel expenses to 15 WBS followup teachers, reimbursed for transportation and meals, not salaried.

h. One exception we have allowed is to provide school tuition for up to four or more students to attend the School of Biblical Studies at Jos or the Nigerian Christian Bible College in Ukpom. After

Internet Impacts Nigeria

Montez Mitchell started teaching Tee Jay Olatunji by Internet, December 2005. He excelled in his Bible studies. In April 2006, he gave Montez the name of a man named Ben who started studying. Then Ben gave her the name of a student named Rachel. In October 2006, Tee Jay asked her to find the local church, resulting in contact with evangelist Makinde Olufemi in Ibadan, Nigeria. Montez kept in touch with them and the others they brought for study. On January 14, 2007, all 13 studying were baptized after digging all day with Makinde to get enough water. Tee Jay will soon start at the preaching school in Ibadan, and Ben and Rachel will soon be married at the church.

Editor's note: Montez' congregation, Church St. in Lewisburg, Tenn., reports a total of 1,350 baptisms in 2006 through WBS. Texas-based WBS Internet reports a total of 6,876 new students enrolled from Nigeria during 2006. graduation they continue as follow-up workers for WBS.

i. Recently we have used "Truth for Today" for maturing our graduates.

We have sent WBS lessons to 80,000 students in Nigeria alone over the last 19 years. Our number of successful graduates exceeds 2,000 men and women. We have received reports of 175 churches of Christ now meeting in our three areas. The WBS program is credited as a major contributor that built these congregations.

2006. Yet in poorer countries like Zimbabwe, where receptivity is also high, similar young people seethe like a pent up flood behind the dam of their poverty. In school after school, across entire nations, millions more would study with WBS if given the chance. Desperate for life-answers, they are ready to explore anything made accessible.

What is the solution for reaching them? Faith-filled prayer! "This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us" (1 John 5:14). Is it "according to His will" that the barriers fall to let millions of youth benefit from the Good News? If you believe, pray for universally viable solutions that fit the needs of both students and teachers. Then expect the dam to burst. In faith, get ready to handle the deluge of responsive WBS enrollees.

In March 2007 the Reeses and Shurs join the Mhlangas, Tsigas and others in Zimbabwe to develop a pilot project for **YOUTHREACH**. The Pottbergs are exploring similar solutions in West Africa and beyond. Take time right now... petition the Father to open the way for young people who cannot afford postage, and to keep that way from being shut. "What He opens no one can shut" (Revelation 3:7). The youth form a strategic front line in the cosmic struggle. We must win this spiritual battle with "weapons of righteousness" — beginning with powerful prayers.

"Can I get one for my grandchildren?"

e often hear that response when people encounter World Bible School's new Children's Series. Even as we produced the series, we felt the same way. We tried out the lessons on our granddaughters. During a visit to Papua New Guinea, we read bedtime stories to Hannah, Hadassah and Rochelle. But that was not good enough. Six year old Hannah soon took over and finished reading the course herself. It was much too exciting to wait for slow installments.

As this *Action!* is being published, so is *Friends Forever*, the last book in the WBS Children's Series. WBS teachers should write to their current students asking if they know children eight years or older that can benefit from age-appropriate Bible study. Ask the children to write you a brief letter, revealing their abilities in writing and English.

Send samples of the Children's Series to known and trusted follow-up men to show others. Again, ask for the letters from the children showing they have the means to correspond with you.

In your regular teaching, if you find stu-

dents who are too young for adult courses, start them on *Becoming Friends*. The adventures of Don and Kay introduce them to great stories of faith from the Old and New Testaments. While being prepared to take regular WBS courses, students learn principles of character like honesty, faithfulness and care for others.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if youth groups used this method to begin their quest to evangelize the world? In many such cases, the WBS students should belong to the group [as a class project], rather than to the individual. This provides continuity for WBS students

Internet for Children

harles Valentine, originator of Children's Bible Study (cbs) online, reports that the World Bible School Children's Series, offered as paper booklets, is attracting response. Since the Series was first offered last March, 1,048 emails have been received signing up children, sometimes several at a time. Last month 199 such emails arrived. Gary Havenhill handles these requests. He reports a retention rate of about 90% for those who sign up for Children's WBS through cbs.

The WBS figures are just a part of so much more. The Children's Bible Study — *childrensbiblestudy.com* — aims to prepare animated presentations of every major Bible character and theme with activities and resources. In January 2007 alone, 61,494 online studies generated 986,338 page hits. About half find the web site through search engines. Since going online, there have been 31,000,000 page hits from over 175 countries.

Charles comments, "Since there are close to 1.2 billion computers with Internet access, the Internet is another incredible tool

provided by God at just the right time... to reach all the people in our world!"

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hen Jimmie Lovell launched World Bible School, he placed small newspaper ads that generated thousands of responses. Many ordinary people in the Third World could afford to respond by mail directly to America. As the world 'advanced' in some sense, the rich became richer but the poor became poorer - less able to afford overseas postage. Eventually WBS opened Service Centers so that students could mail their responses within their respective countries. From each Service Center, WBS sends the students' mail by air to American teaching congregations that happily share the courier expenses, permitting hundreds of thousands to study the life-giving Gospel.



However, in countries like Zimbabwe, the poor become yet poorer. Oppressed by 90% unemployment, 1,000% inflation, AIDS and more, their average life expectancy hovers between 34 and 37.

The postal system still works, but nearly all mail from Zimbabwe has dried up — most cannot afford even local postage. Yet receptivity is as high as ever, as evidenced by astounding results where local WBS collection methods are set up (see Zimbabwe stories in *Action!* July 2006 and January 2007). Congregations in Gadsden, Ala., Amarillo and Midland, Tex.



and Starkville, Miss. have led the way. With the Lord's help, we who coordinate WBS worldwide seek to turn their localized solutions into universal solutions.


Whatever those solutions prove to be, they will be important for reaching Third World youth. Young people in school are often the most receptive (and literate due to required subjects like English and French). Yet, having no income, they can least afford stamps for correspondence. Where they have any opportunity at all, they enroll by the thousands. In Kenya alone, 55,829 high schoolers enrolled during continued on page 5
